# Management's Discussion and Analysis For the nine month period ended November 30, 2008

This Management's Discussion and Analysis ("MD&A") of Carlyle Mining Corp. ("Carlyle" or the "Company") is dated January 29, 2009 and provides analysis of Carlyle's unaudited interim financial results for the nine month period ended November 30, 2008. At January 29, 2009, the Company had 16,000,000 shares outstanding.

The following information should be read in conjunction with, the Company's unaudited interim financial statements and related notes for the nine month period ended November 30, 2008, the Company's audited financial statements and related notes for the year ended February 29, 2008, the Company's News Releases dated July 15, 2008 and December 23, 2008, the Company's Information Circular dated January 21, 2009, and the Company's prospectus dated May 29, 2007. The unaudited financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles in Canada ("Canadian GAAP"), except that they do not contain all the note disclosures required for audited financial statements.

All amounts are expressed in Canadian dollars unless otherwise noted. All documents noted above and any additional information relating to the Company, are available for viewing on SEDAR at <u>www.sedar.com</u> and/or the Company's website at <u>www.carlylemining.com</u>.

# **Forward-Looking Statements**

Certain statements contained in this MD&A constitute forward-looking statements. All statements other than statements of historical fact may be forward-looking statements. #### **Description of Business**

The Company is classified as a Capital Pool Company ("CPC") as defined in TSX Venture Exchange ("TSX-V") Policy 2.4. The principal business of the Company is to identify, evaluate and then complete a "Qualifying Transaction" ("QT") by acquiring an interest in a business or assets. Until the completion of a QT, the Company will not carry on any business other than the identification and evaluation of businesses or assets with a view to completing a potential QT.

The Company was incorporated on January 24, 2007. Its first financial year end was for the period from incorporation to February 28, 2007 and the Company became a reporting issuer in May, 2007. The Company's most recently completed financial year end was February 29, 2008. The Company's only material asset during such periods was cash. The results of the most recent quarter are set out in the Company's unaudited interim financial statements for the nine month period ended November 30, 2008 and discussed below.

The Company began and ended the nine month period ended November 30, 2008 with 16,000,000 shares outstanding.

The Company entered into a share option agreement (the "Original Agreement") dated July 10, 2008, with Rowen Company Ltd. ("Rowen") for the option to acquire 100% of Sunland Properties Limited ("Sunland"). Sunland's wholly owned subsidiary, Rugby Mining Pty Limited, owns or controls certain mineral tenements located near Hawkwood in Queensland, Australia. Pursuant to the Original Agreement, the Company would have, following shareholder approval and TSX-V acceptance of the Qualifying Transaction, issued 200,000 shares to Rowen and repaid Australian \$240,000 (\$191,424) in loans advanced to Sunland by Rowen to cover sunk costs and for exploration expenditures incurred to that time. In addition, the Company would advance to Rowen, A\$25,000 (\$19,940) as a non-refundable deposit.

Subsequent to November 30, 2008 in order to meet TSX-V requirements for completing a qualifying transaction, the Company entered into an Amended and Restated Share Option Agreement (the "Amended Agreement") made and dated for reference December 2, 2008 with Sunland and Rowen.

The Amended Agreement provides that the Company has the option to acquire 60% of Sunland by making payments of A\$200,000 (\$159,520) to Rowen to repay a portion of the loan advanced to Sunland, incur exploration expenditures of A\$3.0 (\$2.39) million (including 20,000 metres of bedrock drilling) over 42 months of which A\$500,000 (\$398,800) is a minimum commitment. In addition the Company will pay A\$25,000 (\$19,940) to Rowen as a non-refundable deposit.

Rowen is controlled by Bryce Roxburgh, a director of Carlyle, not a non arm's length person; as a result this is a related party transaction.

During the nine month period ended November 30, 2008 the Company incurred approximately \$130,000 in costs related to completing a QT.

#### Results of Operations for the nine months ended November 30, 2008

The Company recorded a net loss for the nine month period of \$153,787 which is the result of net interest income earned of \$17,766 less administrative expenses (which includes general administrative costs, bank charges and transfer agent filing fees) of \$171,553. As shown below the majority of these expenses were incurred in the second quarter of the year and reflect the Company's efforts related to the completion of a QT.

(1) Professional fees are substantially related to costs associated with completing a QT.

The quarterly results above reflect the Company's focus on the evaluation of a property or acquisition of assets for its QT, and costs associated with completing a QT.

# **Financial Condition, Liquidity and Capital Resources**

As at November 30, 2008 the Company had cash resources of \$854,798 and working capital of \$820,113. The Company believes that its cash resources are sufficient to meet its currently planned expenditures. As part of the QT, the Company will review the need to complete a financing based upon its assessment of future activities.

The Company's source of working capital to date has been from the sale of its common shares. Under the current economic environment, access to the capital markets to obtain equity financing is very uncertain, and consequently future equity financing may not be readily accessible to the Company.

#### **Contractual Obligations**

Other than the obligations noted above related to the agreement with Rowen for the QT, the Company has no material contractual obligations at November 30, 2008.

# **Related Party Transactions**

Apart from the QT noted above, no related party transactions occurred during the nine month period ended November 30, 2008 except for the reimbursement of expenses incurred conducting Company business. Such expenses are reimbursed at cost.

# **Financial Instruments**

The Company's financial instruments consist of cash, interest receivable, Goods and Services Tax receivable, and accounts payable and accrued liabilities. Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the Company is not exposed to significant interest, currency, or credit risks arising from these financial instruments. The fair value of these financial instruments approximates their carrying value, unless otherwise noted.

# **Risks and Uncertainties**

The Company has no active business or material assets other than cash. It does not have a history of earnings, nor has it paid any dividends and will not generate earnings or pay dividends until at least after the closing of the QT if at all.

The directors and officers of the Company will only devote a portion of their time to the business and affairs of the Company and some of them are or will be engaged in other projects or businesses such that conflicts of interest may arise from time to time. Even though a QT has been entered into, there can be no assurance that the Company will be able to successfully close the transaction.

The QT may be financed in all or in part by the issuance of additional shares of the Company, this would result in further dilution to existing shareholders. Such dilution may be significant, and may also result in a change of control of the Company.

#### **Critical Accounting Estimates**

The Company's significant accounting policies are described in detail in Note 3 of its unaudited interim financial statements for the nine month period ended November 30, 2008. The Company considers the following policies to be most critical in understanding its financial results:

#### Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Significant areas requiring the use of estimates include accrued liabilities; the determination of the assumptions used in the calculation of stock-based compensation expense and the valuation allowance for future income tax assets. Actual results could differ from those estimates used in the financial statements.

#### Financial instruments

Financial instruments are classified into one of the following five categories: held-for-trading, held-to-maturity, loans and receivables, available-for-sale financial assets or other financial liabilities. All financial instruments are measured and recorded in the balance sheet at fair value except for loans and receivables, held-to-maturity investments and other financial liabilities, which are measured at amortized cost. Subsequent measurement and changes in fair value will depend on their initial classification as follows: held-for-trading financial assets are measured at fair value and changes in fair value recognized in net income; available-for-sale financial instruments are measured at fair value with changes in fair value recorded in other comprehensive income until the investment is no longer recognized or impaired, at which time the amounts would be recorded in net income.

#### Loss per share

Basic loss per share is calculated using the weighted average number of common shares outstanding during the period. Diluted loss per share has not been presented separately as the effect of common shares issuable on the exercise of stock options and share purchase warrants would be anti-dilutive. Accordingly, basic and diluted loss per share is the same. Shares held in escrow, other than where their release is subject to the passage of time, have not been included in the calculation of the weighted average number of common shares outstanding.

# **Changes in Accounting Policies Including Initial Adoption**

#### Changes in accounting standards:

# Capital disclosures

In February 2007, the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants ("CICA") issued Handbook Section 1535, "Capital Disclosures", which requires the disclosure of both qualitative and quantitative information that provides users of financial statements with information to evaluate the entity's objectives, policies and procedures for managing capital. The Company adopted the requirements of this section effective March 1, 2008. The initial adoption of this standard had no material impact on the classification and valuation of the Company's interim financial statements.

# Financial instruments

In February 2007, the CICA issued two new standards, Section 3862, "Financial Instruments Disclosures", and Section 3863, "Financial Instruments Presentation". These sections replace Section 3861, "Financial Instruments Disclosure and Presentation". Section 3862 provides users with information to evaluate the significance of the financial instruments of the entity's financial position and performance, nature and extent of risks arising from financial instruments, and how the entity manages those risks. Section 3863 deals with the classification of financial instruments, related interest, dividends, losses and gains, and the circumstances in which financial assets and financial liabilities are offset. The Company adopted the requirements of these sections effective March 1, 2008. The initial adoption of these standards had no material impact on the classification and valuation of the Company's interim financial statements.

# Going concern

In June 2007, the CICA amended Handbook Section 1400, "General Standards of Financial Statement Presentation", which requires management to make an assessment of a company's ability to continue as a going concern. When financial statements are not prepared on a going concern basis that fact shall be disclosed together with the basis on which the financial statements are prepared and the reason why the company is not considered a going concern. The Company adopted the requirements of this section effective March 1, 2008.

Future changes in accounting standards:

# International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS")

In 2006, the Canadian Accounting Standards Board ("AcSB") published a new strategic plan that will significantly affect financial reporting requirements for Canadian companies. The AcSB strategic plan outlines the convergence of Canadian GAAP with IFRS over an expected five year transitional period. In February 2008, the AcSB announced that 2011 is the changeover date for publicly-listed companies to use IFRS, replacing Canada's own GAAP. The date is for interim and annual financial statements relating to fiscal years beginning on or after January 1, 2011. The transition date of January 1, 2011 will require the restatement, for comparative purposes, of amounts reported by the Company for the year ending February 28, 2011 and earlier where applicable. While the Company has begun assessing the adoption of IFRS for 2011, the financial reporting impact of the transition to IFRS cannot be reasonably estimated at this time.

# Management's Responsibility and Oversight

Management is responsible for reviewing the contents of this document along with the interim quarterly financial statements to ensure the reliability and timeliness of the Company's disclosure while providing another level of review for accuracy and oversight.

There have been no changes in the Company's disclosure controls and procedures during the nine months ended November 30, 2008.

# **Internal Controls and Procedures over Financial Reporting**

Management is responsible for the design of the Company's internal control over financial reporting in order to provide reasonable assurance regarding the reliability of financial reporting and the preparation of financial statements for external purposes in accordance with Canadian GAAP. It should be noted that a control system, no matter how well conceived or operated, can only provide reasonable assurance, not absolute assurance, that the objectives of the control system are met.

# **Investor Relations**

As a CPC, and given that a QT has just recently been entered into, at this time, the Company has no formal investor relations program in place.
